Report from J Wright item 8.1

David,

I have received a verbal complaint that the highway verge has been planted up with mature hedging plants, up against the steel Cheshire fencing, at the above so there is no longer a view around the bend, for vehicles or pedestrians.

The hedging was planted last Sunday 22nd Nov. 2023, I spoke to one of the owners, Jamie Rogerson, to say that I had received a complaint, he said that he was an architect, and had checked that he was allowed to plant up the verge, as it was not adopted, he had received many complements about the hedge. He said that the hedge is to provide privacy.

He has partially cut one very large tree down, and two others, from the front garden, a large stump of one remains. The hedge is up to the highway will get taller, wider, and overhang the highway.

There is a planning application for extensions and alterations, App.23/2120M (I could not review this as the application drawings are not shown on the planning web site), but I have been given copies of the plans by the owner, the house is to be extended, and the garage converted.

The house was sold at the end of last year, it is where Ann and Rodger Barlow used to live, and had done so for many years.

Cheshire steel fencing can be seen through and is used to provide visibility for road users at road junctions, sometimes it is stipulated as a planning condition when planning permission is given, for a new development, to ensure adequate visibility, or erected by the council on verges adopted by them, to maintain visibility, it would not normally be erected by private householders on their land.

The property is at the bend in the road (opposite Pepper Street and Brookfield Cottage) there are no pavements, and now, no view round the bend, or grass verge to one side, to take refuge on from oncoming traffic.

This section of road is used a lot by dog walkers, the elderly, children, and other pedestrians, as well as vehicles, it has been frequently used as an alternate route for when Plumley Moor Road is closed (several times this year). The bend is close to Moorcroft Council Estate, where there are families with children and retired/elderly people, who have no option but to walk along the road as there are no pavements.

Pepper Street, at the bend, leads down to a group of dwellings and Holford Hall, and public foot paths and is used by pedestrians, and vehicles.

Grass verges are usually part of the highway, and should not be planted up or obstructed, although the land under the highway is usually in ownership of the property.

Even if the grass verge is not adopted or part of the highway, and the owner has a right to plant a hedge and obstruct the visibility, he may still be accused of causing an accident, or death, if there is a collision on the bend, in my opinion. The owner could provide privacy by the use Venetian blinds, plantation shutters, or move the hedge back from the fencing, to give visibility.

In my opinion the Parish Council/Councillor's, should notify The Highways Dept/Cheshire East, about the danger of an accident that has been created, and the grass verge obstructed ASAP.
